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August 30, 1874

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Continued from Poland Book No 1. by P. S. <sup>[Hilman]</sup> <sub>[Hewitt]</sub>

30 I. I have been engaged some the Week past put Screens across our Trout stream on the flat and I am about commencing to build a cheap dam or two to raise Trout on the Stream west of the turnpike, in the Gay lot. I have to do it myself, and find my own means. It is a little hard to start something out of nothing. But if I live a few years longer, I'll make it tell. If I do not, hopped too much. Which is the Bane and Poison, to all true progress the Lord knows.

Elders Paulina, with 2 of the Colored Sisters from Philadelphia, attended Meeting with us this Afternoon. They are here on a Visit.

Weather Warm and dry, much need of rain. I wrote a letter to day, Humbly asking the Ministry to let Elizabeth Sears, go to Dansville and be doctored up, as her health is very Poor from constant overdoing, beyond what her Physical System could bear, and she has no faith in the old Allopathic mode of treatment. The dietetic and Hydropathic treatment as practiced at Dansville is what she has faith in.

September 1874

12. There has been a Company of young Brethren and Sisters yesterday for a Visit from Enfield Conn, and attended with us to day quite a pretty company. Weather quite dry. I have Michel Maroy 3 days the past Week cutting Brush, part in old clothes squarred up last night. We have taken a Boy and 2 Girls into the Family the past week. I have a letter to Osarah Kentworth, Enfield Conn as he has lost his health, I advise him to go to Dr Jackson Dansville N.Y, and gain it, as the Allopaths have had him a year or two but nothing gained.

13. I. It has been extremely dry. I had a Yoke of Cattle last Thursday to draw Stone for building my Fish dam on the Gay stream, and in the Hurry of busness, I somehow lost my under jaw, of teeth. Last Friday I went to Pittsfield, with a load of Sisters for a ride.

I have lost, or I sawing trout that I had saved, in the a Barrel in the Soap Room, as the renewing water stoped, when I was gone away.

We went to the First Order this morning for a general sing Benjamin G. and I have arranged to get our Young Trout, cheaper than to pay \$15,00 per hundred for the young fry. We think of going up near Rome N. Y. and the Back Woods men to get them, which will not cost over 2 or 3 Dollars per Hundred.

Vol It has been very dry, so that our Cisterns have often been Empty, and our leaden pipes that conduct the Water to our dwellings so empty that Air would get in, and Oxidise the Lead, till the water when again coming thro, would look quite Milky and foam almost like Soda. And so poisonous, that it killed a tank of Fish they had to the Herb House in a few hours, and I had a Dozen nice large Spawning trout killed in a few hours, by letting this Water into a Barrel wher they were, and yet we are compelled to use this Water for drinking and all our Cooking purposes, No wonder that we have become a Family of Invalids, and rheumatics what have not been entirely killed off, will be before a great while if this condition of our water is to continue, we shall die like the Fish.

This State of things is perfectly Horrible, in a Family and forced upon them, by a few Ignorant Leaders who controlled this thing, of having Lead used for Water conductors, and that in the open face of the most solemn protest of many Older ones against it.



September 20, 1874

No. 1. I have been somewhat engaged the week past, in fixing the foundation of my Front Dams, I am fixing one of them, on Washington Hitchcocks land, by his own free will offer, as he has a beautiful Spring for purpose.

Joseph Holder, and Henry Kantrall, have been the week past, to the Fair held at Rochester N.Y. Henry came home yesterday. Joseph has gone to Groveland to stay over Sabbath. We have had over one inch of rain within 2 or 3 days past, a real Equinoctial Storm, Apples and Pears blowed off badly. Grapes are ripening up considerable.

Andrew Barret, has gone up to the North Woods on Sheroga, with Benjamin G. We have an Iron Cover made to our Boiling Kettle at the Wash House the week past.

No. 6 Sat. I have been Albany 2 days this week to get an under set of Seth, and to Seth Green the Great Fish Man, who has an aquarium of Fish on Exhibition at the County Fair now being held on the State Fair grounds. And it was a great sight. Weather quite Warm. I get my teeth, Winsby came home last Monday. I sent a scrip by Elder Robert to them about the middle of the week.

October 1874

No. 4. I have pretty much finished two of the Dams that I have been building for Trout. I went to Hancock Village last Sunday to see about some trout, but they have none. We have had of late over two inches of rain. Yet our Cistern is empty a great part of the time. We shall yet find there is stoppage in the Pipes I think. I am going to build a small Hatching Pond on Washington Hitchcocks land. As he offered it of his own free will and choice, and I have drawn Writings, so that <sup>there</sup> need be no misunderstanding. I hear rumored round House that Elder Robert U. is going to the Office to live. And Elder Calvin G. Reed is coming home from Groveland to be Elder here again. This is House Gossip at present, and so we go along one foot up, and tother down. Joseph started last Monday morning on his Pakepu Seed Point. No frost yet to do any harm.



October 10 1874

9

10 Sat, I have pretty much finished two of my Trout Dams at the Gay lot, intend to build one more on Washington Hitchcocks land.

I went to Pittsfield last Friday, sold a few grapes they are extremely cheap, they can be bot out of the Stores for 10<sup>cs</sup> per lb they buy them for about six cents a pound. Corners and Delerures. We have had about three inches of rain within a Week or two, But our Water is as scarce as ever, what little we get is from the very bottom of the Cistern. We have finished getting in the crops mostly, Elder Robert gets the Cider made at the springs this Fall. They have got the Dry kiln fixed, so they can Dry Roots in it.

18. D. We here the sad news this Week, That Jesse Harwood of Waterliet, one of their Trustees, 70 years of age, fell out of his Wagon and broke his Neck coming home from stroy. Weather quite pleasant the Week past I have finished two of my Fish Ponds, and have commenced putting in Trout as I can get them. Contemplate building one more this Fall. We still continue Water Short, Afflicted most woefully to do our cooking and Washing tho' we have had 3 inches of rain lately. But it is evident that the Water in the Springs we do not get, but a small portion of. But as yet there has not been energy or enterprize enough in those who hold the sole charge of the Water to ascertain what the matter is. Some have been afflected and poisoned with Leaded Water now for a month or two.

25. D. I have again found my under jaw they were found in Pittsfield and advertized, I have been over, and agreed with People along the East side of the Mountain, To furnish them, or such as have Trout Streams running thro' their land, to furnish them my best Notices for Massachusetts on Boards and Parnished, for 75<sup>cs</sup> each, and I am to take it in trout at 2 cents each until I get enough to pay me, if it takes a year or two.

Elder Calvin, was Welcomed in to his place, as an Elder again in the Family last Evening. Weather quite pleasant.

I have filled 2 of my Ponds, west of the Turnpike. Two Deaths at the North House, Anna Cropman & Nancy Lockwood, both quite Aged. Funeral today

## October 1874

25. We have had severat White Frosts the Week past, But very pleasant weather, most of the time. Smokey Weather.

The Ministry and Order Assemble here for meeting this afternoon. Have a very good meeting.

31. Sat. I got of Warner over the Mountain 286 young trout, and put in my Ponds at the Gay lot.

I have made another Dam for Trout on Washington Hitchcocks Lane. We laid up the stone in a day.

Michael, L. Yesterday I had Jack to go over East to carry some Fish Notices, 15 or 16, and came to take my pay in live trout at 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> each, notices 5<sup>0</sup> each, and I am to have one year to hatch them.

The men mostly live in the West part of Pittsfield. Elder Daniel, C. & Clark Hayden, set of for North Enfield last Thursday, for Clark is to remain there, till James Russell is teaching, singing here.

I have, I have thus far put in about 400 Trout this Fall in to my two ponds.

I get my young Trout for an 20 cts each, and some are large enough to spawn this Fall, I get them mostly over East, I have several hundred more due me for Fish Notices when I can catch them. Warner has caught me over a hundred more Trout.



November 1974

1. D. We went to the first Order to Singing this morning. It snowed a trifle last night, and is some cool today - and cloudy.

§ I. It has been good weather for business the week past. I went to Pittsfield last Thursday with the Office Deaconesses on business. There has been considerable thriving this Fall, stealing Buffalo Robes, and clothes from the clothe yard.

The Sisters that have been East this Fall, to learn how to sing and play on the Organ, returned home yesterday, & Br James Russell with them - who is going to stay here, and teach music this Winter. Clark Hayden has gone to Enfield, to work in his stead this Winter.

We have strong Easterly Wines every morning for week now, but no storm, yet very smoky most of the time. I have finished my trout Pond on Washingtons Land, and put in about 200000 sized trout. I have got in near a thousand trout, in all this far, have spent cash for trout, about \$6.00 this far. I have got a good many largish trout for clothing, and have caught considerable many myself. I feed them regular, twice a week, with liver and curd. We are going to the 7<sup>th</sup> Order to meeting today. Fair and pleasant.

14 Sat. It has been a week of considerable on the Musical Strain. We had 3 Organs in the School Room, one Evening, and had Dunham, the great Organist from Pittsfield to play on them, one evening, and Allis Brown from the Hollow one Evening. Brown brot up his Organ, it is considered much better, than the one that Benjamin Co. got. He ask \$2,40.00 for it. And the signs are now, that they mean to keep it, as they have brot the other up into our sitting Room.

This all looks, a little like the Death Struggles between the Flesh, and Spirit. We have attended singing drill every night this week so far. It has been quite cold for now 3 days past. I had the Farm Horses yesterday to bring home, some trout from over east.

I have worn my Hot bed Black Hamburgs with some old worn out Sheets, for the Winter. There is only 10 degrees above zero this morning.

15. D. We have been to the 1<sup>st</sup> Order this morning, and in fact, the Elders of the whole Society, and many of the members of each Family, met there, to hear Elder Frederic and Br John Green, Narrate, what they saw and hear

near Rutland Vermont: at Seances held by the Eddy Boys, or mediums as they are called. Eldress Joanna Kamm and Eldress Dorothy Durgan, from Canterbury were there. They informed us, that they saw several different spirits in Bodily Shape, come forward and speak with audible Voices. And play upon various kinds of Instruments. And that the Spirits Acknowledged that the Shakers were living the most pure and acceptable lives of any People now on Earth. And the more cross a soul took up against their lower natures in this World, the brighter they appeared in the next. This agrees with Mother Ann's Testimony. Eldress Dorothy had a special gift to speak most feelingly, which drew tears from many Eyes. A very Edifying meeting.

It snowed a little this morning, with a Southeast wind.

Elder Giles spoke considerable lengthly on the introduction of Organs amongst Believers, as a means of learning how to make Pure tones, not to gratify an idle curiosity, in killing time, or opening a door for disorder between the Sexes, or in any way to be used in our Worship. The Ministry all united in this.

To D. It looks like Winter. I went over to Kings last Friday, to trim Grape Vines, and it snowed most of the day, he gave me \$1, 50, and a good Dinner. I feed my fish about twice a Week, I boil up offal from the Slaughter House, to feed them with.

It is rumoured that Henry Hollister, who has been been to New York, now for two or three Weeks, to be Doctored, at Miller's Establishment, has concluded not to return, and so it goes. Rail Road sped toward a complete disorganization. And it seems we are in plain sight of it.

The Ministry went to Water whet the past Week. I understand that Eldress Caroline Fletcher, and one other Sister, from North Enfield, have arrived at the Office for a short Visit. Some can sit, and fiddle over the Organ, and kill time pleasantly.

Bro James Russel come up here, <sup>the morning</sup> and drilled us on our Singing. The great fault is, we as a body sing too high, he says, and do not get our throats open so as to make pure Chest tones. Therefore we flat and run our songs down. We must pitch our songs so low that the greatest number of Voices can sing over the highest notes, with a pure breath tone. There is to be a great Shaker meeting in New York, today. Elder Frederic is to be one of the chief Speakers.



November 1874

26. Thurs. Ground froze quite hard, Elizabeth Sears come home from New York last Tuesday, her health somewhat improved, together with a better knowledge how to treat her own case. The Trout pond I built on Washingtons Hitchcocks land, and fed by a never failing Spring proves to be impregnated with some kind of mineral in which Trout cannot live long, I put in between 40 and 50 nice large trout the most of them, and they have all died in about two Weeks.
29. D. Hannah Smith at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Family, Deceased last Friday of Lung Fever. Doctored Allopathically.
- I contemplate building another Pond Dam, this Winter for Trout, As I can do no turning for sale business, As the Machine Shop, is entirely done doing any business, for want of being repaired, A most terrible Shiftless, and uneconomical move I should say, No money to repair a Machine Shop, But enough to get three Organs, for some few, to fiddle on a great part of the time, and so it goes. I think I may as well use my time, or a portion of it raising some Fish, before we go over the Falls, As we are now surely in the last kicking straggles of a dying Organization, and the Lord only knows, its final result.
- We had a warm pleasant day yesterday, but a heavy Rain this morning, and then it snowed most of the day from the Northwest.
- I went to Chatham last Friday on some business respecting Grape Vines.

December 1874

6. D. Weather quite Winter, the warm enough so, I Am making two more Dirt and Brush Dams, for trout, on the Gay lot. I have An Irishman to help me a few days Martin Malone, who has hired the Taylor House to live in, and he is to work for me, to pay the rent I allow him \$1, 25 cents and he boards himself.
- To day, looks quite like Snow, and begins to spit a little this morning, Mr. Jarras, comes up here this morning to drill us on singing.
- I agreed with Henry, Bartred for the swamp where I am building my dams for Fish.
- The 1<sup>st</sup> Order come up here to meeting this afternoon.

13. D. It has been quite Wintery the Week past - We take our turns in going to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Family to watch with Averis Allen who is quite low from the virus inoculated into his hand by dressing Orrisifolous Sores, or Ransome Smith, they are afraid it will cost him his life - I watched with Thursday night, and he wanted I should rub him up with with a wet cloth as this had not been done much of any, and I did it, and thro sympathy and the scent all together, it set me into a diarrhea about midnight, and I have had all that I could do to keep from coming down with a Fever for 2 days past, But now I begin to take a little food again and feel some better - Ground Frozer here but little or no snow -

Have singing meeting this morning, and go to the 1<sup>st</sup> Order to meeting in the afternoon, I do not go on account of Illness -

19 Sat<sup>n</sup> I have been on the Mountain, to put up some fresh Notices, at the Ponds, to prevent people from Fishing there, this Winter, My Pond I built on Washingtons Heticocks Land, and in which, I had 20 or 30 Trout die when I put them in, It appears that the change from the Brook, to that Cold Spring Water was, too great, tho near a Dozen have survived it till now, and appear to be doing well, Weather not so cold as has been, for 2 or 3 days past -

The Ministry come Home from Waterchiet last Wednesday - I hear by the by, that our yearly opening is to come off to Morrow - We shall probably hear to night, in meeting -

20<sup>th</sup> D. We attend to the gift, of general Opening, Weather quite Cloudy, looks like Snow - I understand they are trying to make some New Deaconesses, As Elizabeth Health is quite poor, and not at present able to bear the Burden in that place, But what will be done time must prove, But we all hate to loose Elizabeth from the Deaconesses Lot, tho we know we must should she die, and I think it is the wisest Course, to give her some chance to take care of herself, before it is entirely too late, and see, if she can possibly get better, She has destroyed her health by overdoing, and doing that kind of Work, and more of it than any Female, ever ought to do - But she has done it sincerely for the good of the Family - Tho evidently not the wisest Course in the final result.



December 25<sup>th</sup> 1874

25. Fri. We keep this day, as, Christmas. We have a general Sing at the 1<sup>st</sup> Order this Afternoon at half past 2 o'clock. Weather, some stormy for 2 days past. I have worked 2 days the Week past at the two Dams, I am building on the Gay Stream of Dirt and brush, mostly Alder Brush. As an Experiment to see how they will stand I intend them for Trout.
- 27<sup>th</sup> " I. Elder Calving Eys are Horse, He is down to the Infirmary at the 1<sup>st</sup> Order to be Docterd. I understand we are hereafter to meet at the School House to hold our Singing Meetings, Sabbath Mornings, at 9 o'clock. Weather quite pleasant this Morning. Elizabeth Sears is a little better she thinks on the Whole. They are trying to release her from her burden in the Deaconess lot. But as yet they cannot find any Body that is willing to take her place. How they will do time must prove. To all outward appearances, we are coming up blunt to the Stump. Machine Shop stopped for want of repairing, and a little energy on the part of those who manage it, now every little chour must be done out of the Church unpaie for. Am the 1<sup>st</sup> Order Saw Mill all gone to rack, the New Mill burnt up. And it appears that almost everything has had a stroke of the Falser, so far as real prosperity is concerned. Therefore I conclude, I would work in the open Air and build some Front Ponds this Winter down to the Gay lot. I can earn the most to do this, as things are at present, altho some are oppose, and some are friendly to my operation. But this is unavoidable in all progressive steps. I have commenced this Year to live quite a degree, more simple than I have done, to see its affect on my own health. I eat my Graham Puding and Cracked Wheat, simply Boiled with nothing on it whatever, and plain Apple Sauce with it. I use a little Warm Water with a brife of Molasses in it, this is my general food, and only 2 meals a day at that, take no Supper, as a general thing. There has been no question in my mind but what the Supper, throwt our differant Societies is worse than thrown to the Piggs, or the Fowles. yet it is a habit that take a great while to do away. I went up to the Mountain Ponds to day, to see if any body fishing there, there was no one. Pheba Van Houghton and Katherine Van Houghton two twin Sisters, were appointed to day as Deaconesses in this Family, at present.



January 1875.

17

3. D. It snowed a little yesterday, but changed into the Northwest cold last night. I have by liberty of Edward Fowler Borrowed 10 Hemlock Planks of Clinton Brainard, to make some troughs to go thro my Fish Dams. These planks are to be returned when we saw to Washington. Joseph H. Started his Pokesie Seed Rout last Monday, quite rough Wheeling this Week. I have been down to my Dams to work part of the Week. I have a man once and a while a day when he is not drunk.

We attend Singing Meeting at the School House this morning. Elder Calver has been to the Infirmary at the 1<sup>st</sup> Order for two weeks past to have his Eyes doctored, but it is doubtful in my mind whether they will get any lasting benefit. Till he is willing to come down to a very close diet with repeated Packs in the Wet Sheet to cleanse his whole System, for the Strong Scrofulous taint that he was Born into the World with, that is now what ail his eyes - his old Humors have all centered there.

He again needs to onto the close diet that I was obliged to keep him on when a child, in order to have him live to grow up. I should not have the least doubt but I could entire cure his Eyes, in two months, but I should let his Eyes alone, and cleanse and purify his general System, and his Eyes will take care of themselves. He has greatly injured them in my opinion, all near, by harsh applications. Even before he returned from Groveland. He is now letting his Beard grow to help his Eyes, but this will not cleanse his System.

10. D. We have Singing at the School House this morning. Elder Solomon Rankin from South Union Ho. E. Elder Otis Sawyer, Elder John Vance, from Main, all attended. Afternoon we attended meeting at the first Order.

17. D. Singing thro the Week at the School House, also this morning. Sabbath morning, Deacons and all attend who are able. Joseph Holden, and Henry Merrill, set off last Thursday for New England N. H. to see something about steaming food for stock. It has been at times the Week past 12 or 14 degrees below zero, in the hollow, 24 below. The dirt is frozen so hard, I have not done much at my dams on the Gay

Hon Jones, at the Springs, says he thinks, we can get all the small trout we want ourselves, in the Springs and Brooks. I have engaged him to go a day with me and try over back up Stephen town way, was to have had the Mustangs Horses last Wednesday, but it was to Stormy Jones has appointed next Tuesday to go, if the Weather is good.

I have written a letter to T S Hubbard Fredonia N.Y. about my New Grapes, giving him the offer to purchase them to bring in to market.

24<sup>th</sup> Joseph H. & Henry H. got home yesterday from their Eastern Visit. Weather extremely cold most of the Week past. I went on the Mountain last Friday to get some Pickeral for Sarah Ann Linn, who is quite sick with the dropsy, I got 6 but three home, alive and put in our upper Mill Pond. Weather this day Friday, a little milder

- 24 D. The weather has been so cold, I have not yet been with Jones, to get Trout but intend to go the first suitable day. Wind Southeast to day, gathering for a storm. We attend Singing at the Schoolhouse as usual this morning.
- 31 D. I have been over East two days the week past, with Brooms, with Andrew, Benjamin's Teamster on the Hill. Snowed all the first day, sold mostly out. We attend Singing at the School House, as it is the last Sabbath that Br James Russell is going to attend with us. After an hours singing, he retires with Br Benjamin Gates, and the rest of us stay, to learn some Parsonells Songs, to be sung this afternoon and to morrow Evening when we take our final leave, as he goes to Waterwhit on Tuesday on Tuesday, Washington Jones is going up with him. We also appointed Elder Calvin Reed, to teach after James is gone, as the best qualified at present of any one amongst us, and we agreed to support him, and respect him, as a teacher, in doing the best he can. Br James says, that Elder Calvin understands the Science of Music, as well as he does, altho his Voice is a little deficient in showing, all the points, But, I must say, I have never seen Br James Enquire, he is so unassuming and so God like in all his deportment, and so clear and pleasant in all demonstrations of the science of music, that it would seem as tho even a nonconformist might learn of him. He has thus taken unpareled pains, with the youth and children. In fine, he has surely done himself, and the Society at Enfield, and the Science of Music, great Honor in this Society. The Elder Frederic Cross, at the North did not think they could be benefited, by attending his Singing meetings the Winter past. But I with many others think that both the Elder Frederic, and some others might have learned, some very useful Lessons, in real gospel Nobility, and in a truthful manner, of teaching others, and imparting his Knowledge, Entirely devoid of all of all Unchristianity, Show, or Worldly Display. I repeat it, that no true Child of Mother, could help being benefited by attending his Singing meetings the Winter past.

6 Sat. Awful Calamity.

About half past 11 O'clock A.M. the loud and long ringing of the Bell on the Great House at the 1<sup>st</sup> Order, and the shrill Whistle from the Herb Shop, gave the Alarm of fire, the 1<sup>st</sup> Orders Wood Shed was on fire. And in 3 minutes it was in a Dense Blaze. It being very cold and the wind blowing a Gale from the North West, the Great House was in a blaze, and but few things in comparison to what was in the Building was saved. Considerable bedding was thrown out at at the Windows, all that could be got out was carried into the Meeting House, the Infirmary except the Road was now being cleared of contents as fast as possible and carried North up into the Orchard. The west side of the House already beginning to take fire, but by almost the Super human Exertions of Henry Elden, Sons, and Men, with several Fire Extinguishers they saved that building being burnt, tho' badly damaged. When the Great House Roof fell, a Sheet of fire went directly over the East Spinshop, to the East Barn, and in a few that was all in a light blaze, they made at to get all the Oxen out but two they were burnt, the Waggon & Carl Shed, with the Old Order Mill, were all swept clean, with three of Lumber, Packing Boxes, Carriages, and every thing. The Ministers Shop was also burnt and the Meeting House was only saved by the greatest Exertion, 5 Buildings in all were burnt, and several only escaped from the Flames with what they had on their backs. The calamity that our loss is from one Hundred and twenty five Thousand to one Hundred and fifty Thousand. And for what by the Carelessness of Crusting Coal, Aspes, right close to the Wood House, so that the wind blew them against the Wood Works, and there <sup>our</sup> own reckless disregard, of making any provision of Hydrants from our Ponds, and Cisterns above us to put out fires. As we have been exhorted to do for 20 or 30 Years past, both <sup>by</sup> visible, and invisible Spirits, and we have clearly, and plainly told <sup>that</sup> our present Calamity would surely come upon us if we did not take some such precaution; but this warning made do difference; Had we made

This provision, which could have been done easily done, for, 3 thousand Dollars, we could have saved all these buildings but the Wood House. And we are daily in danger of being burnt up in this second order in like manner, and it will surely take place unless we take the timely precaution, as we have been warned. For what ~~was~~ taken place, was clearly seen, to take place, for years before it come to pass, and time warning given, but no attention paid to it, and what will, as surely take place here with our big House, has been as plainly seen, if the warning is disregarded; And, as the Lord lives if we continue to go on in this reckless manner, disregarding all the council and forewarning, from the powers above, we shall as a people organized in societies, be destroyed, and scattered to the four Winds. The two Elder Daniels came very near losing their lives in time of the fire. Andrew Sweet fell and broke his shoulder. And many others were slightly injured. I have

17 D. We have no meetings to day. But have been taking care of things as best we could, and making provisions for the Houslep, to sleep, and eat, part of of the first order come here for their meals and some eat to sleep to their Washhouse, and some to Buck Shop Gunner Shop and Infirmary, and some to the South House.

14 D. I have been staying with Elder Daniel Boler night and day, trying to save his life if possible. A Dr from Australia, a very Skillful, Ex Electric Dr, he staid over a Week on account Elder Daniels and others - Golden Brown, Disceas'd last Friday Night in an apoplexy Fit - Never, never before was such a distressing time in this Church - Elder Daniel is much better. Weather has been quite cold, and extremely icy. Elders from Waterwheel, Ministers from Canterbury and Africa have been here since the fire to find out what is mostly needed, Elder John Vance and Elder Otis Sawyer Bro't a Thousand Dollars yesterday and gave to the Leacons. And others are sending in Clothing and other needfuls - We telegraphed to Pittsfield, in time of our fire for them to come with a fire Engine, to help smother the flames which they did, And they did nobly

to Extinguish Fires, now for many years, and have  
taken no means of ourselves, not even as much as to  
get a good hand Engine, and greatly to our own  
Shame and disgrace - And I am still doubtful

the thick scales, from some of our Lament Temporal  
Leaders Eyes, who carry the Bag.
