

Emily Lattimore's Vision in meeting, Sabbath day, Sept. 3, 1837.

while labouring in the quick manner I saw two sisters come into the meeting room; they took hold of my hands, & one asked me if I was not willing to go with them. I said, yea, if sister Tina is willing. They took me to sister Tina; asked her if she was willing, & she said, yea. I was then taken out of the meeting room into the hall; & sensed myself going some distance off, when we came to a field of green grass, on the tops of which were blue birds. The sister picked four of them; put them into my hands, & they smelled some like an orange. we soon came to a white house & went up a high set of stairs to a room where there were three sisters dressed in white & had bright crowns on their heads like gold. my guide said their names were mother Ann, mother Lucy & Elderess Molly; told me to sit down, & I did by the side of mother Ann. The two sisters who came with me, then left me & went out of the room. mother Ann asked me if I would not be good: I told her, yea. Elderess Molly then took me down stairs into a room where there were brethren & sisters sitting in ranks, & as we passed between them they rose up & bowed to us. she soon took me out of that house to another one near by, & up into a room where there were a good many brethren & sisters assembled in meeting, labouring & motioning in a new manner which I had never seen before. They were dressed in white & on each one's head were four birds. she then took me to another room where the younger part of the brethren & sisters were in meeting. The singers stood in one straight row through the middle of the room. The brethren faced the brethren & the sisters faced the sisters. some laboured in checks of eight, & others in no regular order. I was then taken to another meeting where there were not so many brethren & sisters, labouring in checks, & the singers stood in the same position as before. They were all dressed in white, & had on their heads crowns like gold. Here I saw Beniah Lovons. she talked some to me, but I do not remember what it was. Then Elderess Molly took me out of that house, & we came some distance from it to a field of green grass which looked natural; said I must go home, & left me. I came out of my vision, & found myself standing in the ranks just before meeting was dismissed.
