At one time, you felt equal to giving her a helping hand and it was very much appreciated. I am asking if you could repeat the good deed.


As you know, investments there are very, very small, income from all sources is at a minimum and expenses loom large.

Your check came from Elder Arthur yesterday, and I could not keep the tears back, I felt so grateful, and to say I thank you seems very small indeed for your generous gift. I had told the sisters that I could run the family on what I had, but two weeks longer, and to be in debt is a crime to me, for in my young years, I worked to help pay debt at three different times, so it is a nightmare to me. I never mean to cry the burden of the Lord, but ever since the Alfred people have been here, it has been sickness, operations and hospital bills, and you know what that means. At the present

time we have one of the Alfred  
young sisters in a Sanitarium in  
Vermont, that the doctor thought  
might be cured of her troubles up  
there, but between you and I, she  
will only be an invalid the rest  
of her days. It is a shame, for she  
is a very sweet, loyal sister that  
every one loves, old and young. Her  
bill is twenty dollars a week. I have  
worried and planned, until I worked  
all night in my dreams, going to  
Portland trying to sell things to pay  
our bills. I don't want to infer that  
the Alfred people are a burden, for  
they have been so good and helpful,  
and try every way to do little things  
to bring into the family, but as yet  
no trade is coming in. They have  
been unfortunate, that is all, and I  
would not say anything to hurt their  
feelings for the world, for we are a  
very happy family.

doing what we could, but the sickness  
is what takes your profits, so there is  
nothing left for repairs and painting  
our buildings. Now don't let what I  
write worry you, for we shall get along,  
but it is good to have some one to talk  
to, I just wish you were here, or I was  
there, I try to "Carry On" and not complain,  
for I would not discourage the young  
people, for they are all willing to do, to  
the last minute. I thank you again and  
send my best love for you and Sadie, from
