Your letter of 18 Jan^y reached me in due time, advising that you had written me some months before which letter I did not receive, probably it was misdirected -

Mr. Fowler to whom you sent the bill of Herbs, got into trouble and sold out his concern in Sacramento and is now a clerk in the retail drug store of Keith & Co. of this city. At his request, I wrote to the party in Sacramento, demanding payment of him as he received the goods - but he wrote in reply denying his liability in the matter and refusing to pay - I showed his letter to Fowler, who said he would write to his Attorney in Sacramento and give me an answer when he had heard from him - Thus the matter stands - If I can sway the money out of Fowler, it will be all right, if not, he may plead the Statute of limitations, which is one year on a book account, and it will be throwing

good money after had to undertake to force
him - as I know from my own experience -

I have hopes however of being able to
get the money out of him by a little man-
agement and as soon as anything is done
will at once communicate with you
