I write you these few lines at Mr. Fowler's request and for your own use privately. Mr. Fowler and myself talked over the matter in dispute between us, and at my request he named a figure, at which he was willing to settle the whole dispute and give the deed. Although I thought the figures excessive and out of all reason, I nevertheless submitted them to Mr. Duncan in Mr. Fowler's presence. But Mr. Duncan declined entirely to entertain them, and demanded that as he had been induced unwillingly to consent to the arbitration, that the arbitration should be proceeded with, and he not be obliged to go over the whole ground again. That was the end of Mr. Fowler's interview with Mr. Duncan.

If I can do anything further in the matter you and Mr. Fowler can command me.
