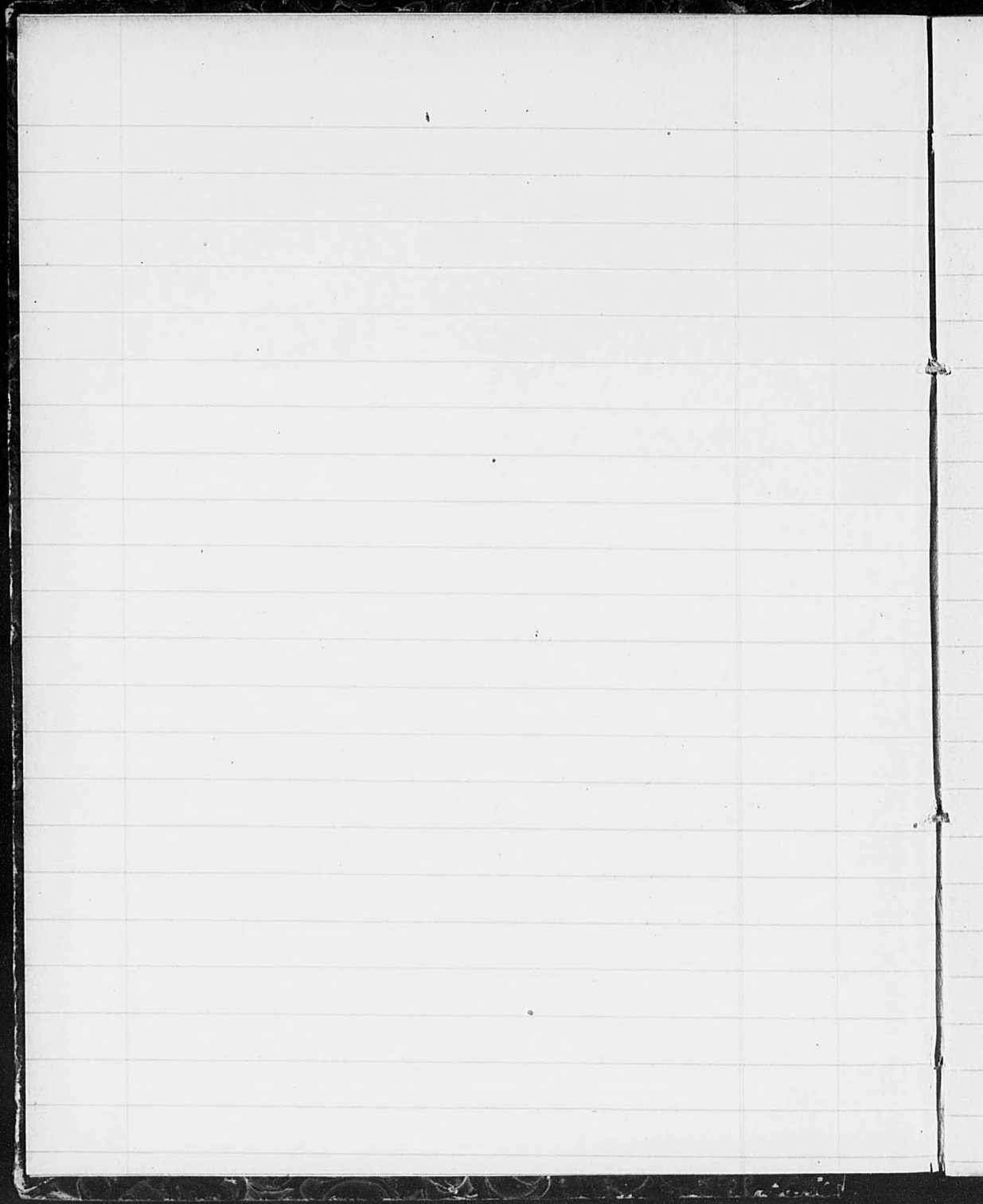

Jan 8. Julia Ann is employed lining two large Buffalo Robes. She with Wren and Mary H. go to the Springs for some suitable lining. Andrew takes Florinda, Cornelia and Dorothy to tin shop. Sarah Ann Hand, and Anna go to the Mill, most excellent sleighing and fine weather.

I am happy to say we have nothing very serious to record. Susan Maria has been from home for her health since August. We had rather an unusual amount of Journeys, which will be found recorded in proper place.

The Telephone has appeared in our street, But the old foundation rough and rugged still is unimpairedly conspicuous, and the want of walks on the South and West of our House.

House plants have become frequent and common. Pictures are at growing work, No death has occurred, Nelson Mickels has removed to Howard, Laura Hutcheson has left. We have gathered 6 women, one little girl 1 man 1 boy = 9 in all now. I think we number 87 souls. p. 53 m. 27.
