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Dear Be Robert,

My thoughts often go out towards you, "I am often with you, I love you, I bless you, Do you feel me near?" This is the language of disembodied spirits to those in the body. Why cannot spirits in the body thus commun? By the way this new spiritual manifestation is a wonderful affair. I learn that it is attracting more and more public attention. An intelligent man, a visitor at the North House yesterday remarked, that "the spirit knockings" had already changed the theological views of 40,000 people in the U. S. Truly the new manifestation has many beautiful features, in fact 'tis all beautiful,—especially the revelation that the Spirits above, do not blame us poor mortals for our foibles, considering the circumstances with which we are surrounded, but say, "Father forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Perhaps I was too hasty in my remarks about Doct. Phelps and La Roy Sunderland;— Says David "I said in my haste all men are liars." The evidences to my mind of the truthfulness of the new manifestation grow stronger, yet not fully satisfactory. You Be Bobt are favorably situated to thoroughly investigate this important matter. Will you write to me soon, and if you feel free, touch upon this subject, if not, upon any other you may feel to.

I received also, in due time & order, the "Chronotype" of Dec. 2, containing T. Parker's sermon. I reserve "comment".

Enclosed, I send thee copies of a short correspondence between myself and Sunderland, thinking thou wouldst be pleased with the knowledge of them, being Partly concerned.

In the "Journal of Commerce" of the 1st inst. an extraordinary circumstance is related, as transpiring at Fall River, on the 26th ult. in relation to the "Mysterious Rappings", about a certain man, who, as a "medium" for the Spirits, while operating with a table, instantly fell down "dead". -

Our beloved Ministry (who are now here) - our beloved Elders, Brethren & Sisters, all send their united love & blessing to thee. Well "organized" with the whole, are my particular love, and well-wishes to thee - with a goodly portion of the same, and my respectful remembrance to Sister Hannah. -
