# SHAKER MUSEUM AT O. CHATHAM

4,000 Items Depicting
Life Of Group To
Be Displayed

Invitations have been issued by John S. Williams of Old Chatham, for the opening of Good Hope, a Shaker museum, on his property Saturday, July 22, from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.

The collections at Good Hope were acquired over a period of years, and now comprise some 4000 items covering most phases of Shaker life. Housed in three buildings the major effort has been to preserve machinery, tools, and household articles with which the Shakers lived and worked.

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The majority of the collection comes from Mt. Lebanon, but there are also items from Watervliet, Hancock, and Canterbury. From Mt. Lebanon are the complete blacksmith shop of the Church Family including foundry patterns; the carpentry shop of the Church Family, and the medicine manufacturing and bottling room; from the North family furnishings of the kitchen and laundry.

Also included among the displays are manufacturing devices covering basket-work, boxes, mops, brooms, cut palm and poplar shoes and powdered sage. One building is devoted to material closely associated with the late Sister Emma J. Neale, whose unfailing interest made the project possible. There will be also two typical bedrooms, and a representative collection of furniture of Shaker manufacture. Printing is covered by a group of volumes of Shaker manufacture, and there is also a small collection of Shaker manuscripts.

The cataloging, arrangement, and care of the collection has in recent years been under the direction of Phelps Clawson, Honorary Curator of Ethnology of the Buffalo Museum of Science.

### that Lie, Shaker Museum at Old Chatham House Work Of Dwindling Sect

When a few years ago the last of OLD FIRE ENGINE when a few years ago the last of the Mount Lebanon Shakers depart-ed from Columbia County, they left behind them the heritage of more than a century of unique, gallant, and also useful living; a heritage which, since the Shakers are fast becoming an extinct set, might soon becoming an extinct set, might soon have been forgotten, were it not for the efforts of a Common County man, who, since 1935, has been working to gather together the symbols and implements of Shaker cul-

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Fifteen years ago, John S. Williams of Old Chatham, realized that the death knell had already sounded for the Shaker families on Mount for the Shaker families on Mount Lebanon. Although they carried on with incredible gallantry, following a pattern of life established in the eighteenth century by Mother Ann Lee, foundress of the sect, their numbers were few and the members old. Mr. Williams had a sincere admiration for the Shakers whom he regarded as people of extreme faith and as artisans whose work had an extraordinary esthetic quality. It distressed him to see them gradually disposing of their goods, many of them museum pieces, to people who them museum pieces, to people who didn't know the history of the objects they bought, cared less, and would in a few years probably throw them away.

them away.

A collection of Shaker relics he felt, should be made and kept in Columbia County, not as the property of a private individual but as a public trust, a memorial to a strange group of people who came to this valley and in their own quiet and unobtrusive way made it a beter place in which to live.

He began this collection and in the ensuing years he worked at it unceasingly until today it numbers close to four thousand pieces which represent the whole scope of Shaker life and includes everything from a

life and includes everything from a needle to a four-ton trip hammer

While he was making the collec-on, Mr. Williams had the feeling of racing against time. So much had already been lost and within a few years unless it were quickly gathered up, everything else would be gone. The task of gathering grew nore and more feverish.

AIDED BY SHAKERS

It was made easier, however, by the Shakers themselves. Realizing that the collection would be their monument in the years to come, they gave the utmost cooperation, especially the late Sister Emma Neale without whose faith and help Mr. Williams says, the job would have horseed down and ner would have bogged down and perhaps been abandoned.

Of course many of the things collected were old, had not been used in many years, and were not in top condition. Someone had to be found to do this all-important work, and the very person turned up in the person of Phelps Clawson, also of Old Chatham.

Mr. Clawson, who is honorary Curator of Ethnology of the Buffalo Museum, is a trained Egyptomologist, used to picking tiny pieces of this and that from the sands of the Sahara desert and working with them until the residue of tens of thousands of years was removed and were restored they to a near approximation of their original state and use. The job, then, of taking old and dirty Shaker machines apart, cleaning and repairing them, quarter inch by quarter inch, did not try his patience as it would another perpatience as it would another per-son's and the job of preparing and cataloging the collection became his. He also joined in the hunting down of pieces and turned up many valuable objects.

Of course, as the collection

grew larger, housing it became a problem.

Mr. Williams then decided to convert the huge barns on his property into a museum and in the past year or more that has been done and the collection has collection has been brought and arranged by Mr. Clawson. there

The final steps are now being taken to make the collection a public trust and the museum is being formally opened this Saturday, July

Besides the big barn the collection takes up two other smaller buildings, one devoted to Sister Emma Neale. The complete forge shop of the Church family, Mount Labaran Shakars a medicine shop Lebanon Shakers, a medicine shop, typical Shaker men and women's bedrooms, a tool shop, a basket making shop, and several top ex-amples of Shaker inventiveness, including a fire engine which was built at Canterbury, N. H. in 1822 by the Shakers there. It is said to be able to throw a one-inch stream of water 90 feet in the air and is operated by 24 men; a four ton trip hammer; and a washing machine which is believed to be one of the first, if not the first ever invented, are included in the collection.

Most of the objects have been obtained from the Mount Lebanon Shakers, but various parts have also been given by the Shaker families at Watervliet (Nisayuna); Hancock Mass.; and Canturbury, N. H.

After Saturday the museum will be open each day during certain hours. Application has been made to

hours. Application has been made to the Regents of the State of New York for a charter and its granting is expected within the near future.


