
I am still hoping that someone will be found to finance the film and, if you have any ideas or suggestions, please let me know.



But I think, after the amount of time and effort expended upon the part of so many boys and girls, as well as a number of our paid staff, to give the demonstrations at the Festival and adequately prepare some of the Museum equipment, it is pretty rough to see publicity stories with "stand-ins" representing the demonstrators, as shown in the enclosed story, and without even a mention in the text of Shaker Village kids having done the job.

It was bad enough to have stand-ins for the advance stroy spread all over the press (and again without any reference to our contribution to the event and the Museum), due to the fact that we could not interrupt our schedule to send staff and kids and transportation over for the pictures by the Eagle on less than 24 hours notice. The Shaker Ritual Religious Service rendered by teen-age members of Shaker Village Work Group was originally recreated with the assistance of the late Shaker Brother Ricardo Beldon, as well as other members of the Shaker Society. With this assistance from the Shakers themselves and research carried on over many years from published and original manuscript material, the teen-age boys and girls of the Work Group, which was founded by Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Count and is now under their direction, began to render the recreations of the Service in the late 1950's and will be given at the Shaker Museum Festival at 2 P.M. in August. The teen-age boys and girls who will participate in the re-creation of the Service come from 20 states and areas, as far away as Oregon, the middle west, Florida and South Carolina, in order to participate in the eight-week Work Group program at the Mount Lebanon Shaker settlement, which has just been declared a national historic monument for preservation by the U.S. Dept. of Interior.

We are indeed most grateful for the envelope of documents which you were so thoughtful as to send us. As you may recall, we have a large advertising poster of the Shaker Blood Syrup, and had understood that the Shakers disapproved of it heartily, because, so we were told, it was an unauthorised use of their name, and also because is claimed to cure so wildly improbable a catalogue of ills. These documents are the first we have seen to give legality to these alleged protestations.

Apparently A.J. White, Ltd., was the London branch of the well-known A.J. White Company of New York, who seem to have been long-time agents of the Shakers. We have several bottles of Mother Siegel's Curative Syrup or Extract of Roots, one bearing a "finely executed steel engraving" of the label, put out by the London branch to prevent fraud. I gather this label is subsequent upon the London agreement you sent us.

If I read it aright, the correspondence with Emma Neale with regard to the registration of a trade mark referred specifically to the word "Shaker", and not especially to any particular design although a drawing seems to have accompanied the application.

These documents are indeed of great interest and value to the Museum, and we are most grateful to you for giving them to us. Should you care to take them off your income tax as a gift-deduction to a non-profit educational institution, be advised that we have evaluated them collectively at \$40. It is difficult to arrive at a figure for such material, but these seems to us a fair and reasonable one.

A booth will be provided for sale of Shaker Village products, and various crews from the workshops mentioned above will demonstrate Shaker Crafts to the public during the hours mentioned. Usually some 2,000 members of the public attend the Festival and this is an unusual opportunity for villagers to demonstrate their skills and responsibility.

Will Betsy please arrange a meeting of the various staff members involved in this event, so as to co-ordinate the transportation arrangements and taking whatever equipment is needed. Staff members who are not already familiar with equipment available at the Museum for these demonstrations, should arrange to visit the Museum in advance so as to know what materials and equipment will have to be brought from Shaker Village to make the demonstrations effective. Deer Bob:

In checking through on the Shaker leads in Sweden, I consulted with a number of people, including the outstanding religious sociologist, who had not heard of the involvement of any Swedes with the Shakers. A historian at the Nordic Museum in Stockholm gave me a good lead which I am now passing on to you, concerning the Elfdalen people. He said that Hr. Evert Ans, of Rots Skans, Alvdalen, Sweden (a "self-made museum man", it was said) is the man running a local museum in what is the area from which the Swedes came who went to Kentucky. Write to him for the information you would like to have and say that you were recommended to him by Musellector Skans Torsten Milsson of the Nordic Museum in Stockholm. Apparently, Alfdalen is the modern version of the Elfdalen of the 1860's.

I ran into a blank wall on tracing the possibility of Shaker influence on Swedish modern design. Most Swedes trace the beginnings of Swedish Modern to a craftsman 's exhibit of 1917, but in the Stockholm restoration museum I found traces of functional design extending back into the 1800's. Generally, the level of craftsmanship in rural areas in the 1800's is very primitive, compared to that of the Shakers. Not until the middle 1800's are there signs of refinement in design and craftsmanship in the rural areas — at least so far as is shown in their restoration museum. This is also true of Denmark and Finland, where I also saw two restoration museums.
