





## Barred cell.

According to Robert Max Maeder, the Shaker Museum ka at Old Chatham has documents showing kikkaxax medical bills and correspondence with the State Mental Hospital at Potghkeepsie relating to a Mrs. ar Miss Katrina Koch, who resided with the South Family, but was not a member, It is believed that she occupied the barred cell in the above building between 1913-1916. Mr. Wm. Lassister, of the State Museum in Albany, also furnished information concerning the above.

It is possible, Mr. Maeder says, that the cell was used earlier than this for other occupants.
